The School-Based Diversion Initiative (SBDI)

A Restorative Approach to Addressing Student Behavior

What is SBDI?

A model that helps schools implement more equitable and restorative practices to better support student behavioral health needs and reduce exclusionary discipline. Goals:

- REDUCE the number of youth who are suspended or arrested in school
- BUILD knowledge and skills among school staff to recognize and manage behavioral health crises in schools
- LINK youth at risk for juvenile justice involvement to appropriate community-based services and supports

Proven Outcomes

Since 2009, **82 Connecticut schools** across **29 participating districts** have seen these meaningful results:









decrease in court referrals

increase in mobile crisis referrals

decrease in OSS

School Highlight

Following two years of SBDI implementation, court referrals at New Britain High School decreased from **73** in 22-23 to **just 16** in 24-25!

What Do Schools Get?

- Funding from CT State Department of Education to support implementation
- CHDI Project Coordinator assigned to support implementation of SBDI
- No-cost professional development for staff on trauma-informed behavioral health topics and Restorative Practices
- Individualized technical assistance provided by Restorative Practices Trainers
- Strengthened connections to community based services
- Discipline policy consultation to form a Graduated Response Model
- School Health Assessment and Performance Evaluation (SHAPE) completion and review
